 educators feel comfortable teaching students how
 to protect themselves from online cyber predators,

 recent study by The National Cyber Security
 Alliance (NCSA) and Educational Technology, Policy
 Research and Outreach (ETPRO)

At a time when children ages 10-to-14 spend more
 time on the Internet than watching television, the
 study found that only the Commonwealth of Virginia
 has education curriculum requirements that include
 information on how students can protect themselves
 online. Since completion of this study, several
 more states including Georgia, Illinois and
 Tennessee, have passed legislation requiring
 online safety education in the classroom. In
 addition, 90 percent of educators have received
 less than six hours of professional development on
 cyber security in the past year.

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
